

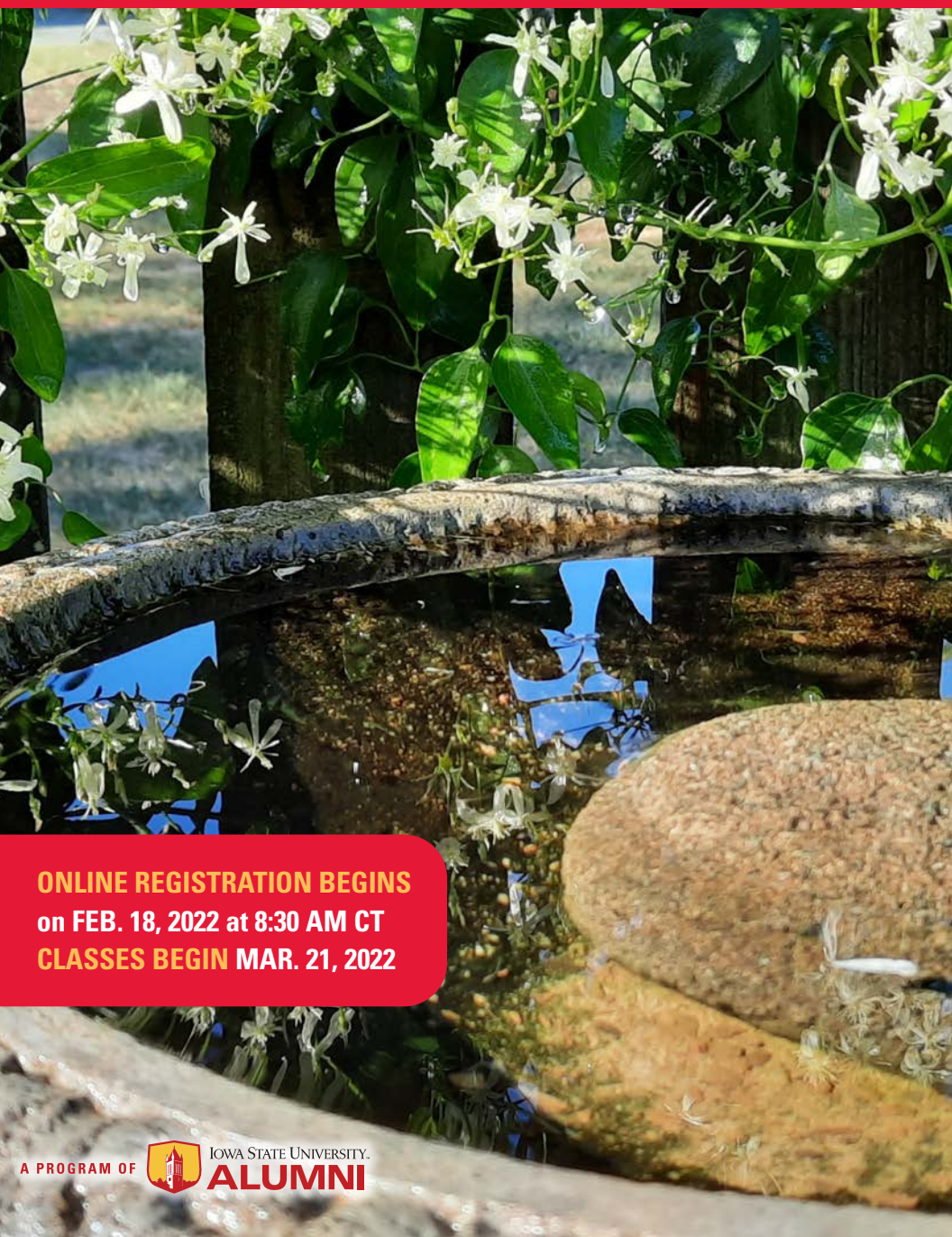

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FROM THE DIRECTOR



Dear Colleagues,

As I'm writing this letter, COVID has not gone away and actually there are two additional variants, but the Curriculum Committee and I know that many of you are ready to have in-person classes. So, during the spring session we will be offering some in-person classes. However, should COVID guidelines change, we will move to offering only online classes. If we must make this change, we will inform you as soon as the decision is made. Otherwise, all in-person classes are scheduled for a Tuesday or Wednesday and some of them will also be offered as a hybrid.

What is hybrid learning?

Hybrid learning for the OLLI at ISU program means some of you will attend the class in-person with the instructor at the Alumni Center, while other members will join online from home at the same time.

Those attending online will be able to:

- Hear and see the instructor
- See any materials projected on the screen
- Ask questions by chat or verbally
- Hear comments and questions made by those taking the class in-person (very important for those participating in-person to use a microphone when speaking)
- Participate in small group discussions with breakout rooms

The technology committee has done trial runs and it should work without any problems, but as you all know, computers seem to have a mind of their own at times.

Please remember the following:

- Being in-person, a hybrid, or all online is determined by the instructors and their comfort levels. We appreciate our instructors and want them to feel comfortable.
- Any in-person classes are scheduled for a Tuesday or Wednesday and will be held in the Reiman Ballroom at the ISU Alumni Center. Not all classes scheduled on a Tuesday and Wednesday will be in-person or a hybrid.

- When registering for a class, look carefully at how it is going to be delivered; in-person, online, hybrid: in-person, or hybrid: online.
- You will pick the method of delivery and stay with it for each session of that class.
- At the time this is being written, vaccines/boosters and masks are not mandated, but we will follow the current policy of the university.

COURSE LOCATIONS AND DELIVERY METHODS

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW TO TAKE AN OLLI CLASS THIS SPRING:

IN-PERSON

- Most of the classes offered on Tuesdays and Wednesdays will be offered in-person or as a hybrid class.
- At the time this is being written, vaccines/boosters and masks are not mandated, but we will follow the current policy of the university.
- At the time this is being written we plan to offer in-person classes. Should COVID guidelines change, we will move to online only classes.

HYBRID

- Classes offered as a hybrid will have two class numbers to choose from, hybrid: in-person and hybrid: online. Be sure to register for the class number that represents how you wish to attend. Whichever option you choose is how you will attend every session for the class.
- At the time this is being written we plan to offer hybrid classes. Should COVID guidelines change, we will move to online only classes.

WHAT IS HYBRID LEARNING?

Hybrid learning for the OLLI at ISU program means some of you will attend the class in-person with the instructor at the Alumni Center while other members will join online with Zoom from home at the same time. Those online will be able to:

- Hear and see the instructor

ONLINE (OR BY PHONE) WITH ZOOM

OLLI at ISU will utilize the Zoom video conferencing application to deliver the online aspect of our courses. You do not need your own Zoom account to participate. Instructions for joining the class will be sent via email (or a phone call for those joining by phone) to those who are registered. You will see and hear the instructor, any presentation documents, and other class members on your computer screen. If you have questions, you will be able to ask the instructor or submit them through a chat window.

We know that online presentations cannot replace the in-person experience, but they do provide us the opportunity to participate and continue learning while we can't be together physically.

PHONE:

You don't need a computer or iPad to participate in a class – you can use your telephone to call in and participate as if on a conference call

A call number is provided by mail in time for your first class

COMPUTER, SMART PHONE, IPHONE, OR IPAD:

- A reliable internet connection
- Speakers on your device

Camera and microphone on your computer are optional; it enhances your experience but is not mandatory.

CANCELLATIONS AND REFUNDS

OLLI membership dues are non-refundable.

If a registration is cancelled **before** 4:30 PM CT, **Monday, Mar. 14, 2022**, a \$10 service fee will be retained. The \$25 nonrefundable membership fee will also be retained if it was paid with the course registration.

There will be no refunds for cancellations made **after** 4:30 PM CT, **Monday, Mar. 14, 2022**.

Refunds will be processed after classes begin.

CANCELLATIONS DUE TO WEATHER

#01 – Investing for Impact

Much has been in the news, politics, and new legislation related to issues that affect climate change, social justice, and the way companies are run. When it comes to investing, these and related issues have been collected under the heading of “Environment, Social and Governance” or ESG Investing. In this class, we will explore some of the ideals of ESG investing, and how you can invest your accumulated wealth so as to have the greatest impact in promoting those ideals.

Steve Larson is currently the Chief Investment Officer of Clarity Asset Management in Ames. Larson graduated from Iowa State University in 1975 with a business degree in Industrial Administration. The ferns and grasses are each uniquely different from other native plants in Iowa. The ferns make use of multiple strategies in their life cycle and reproduction. The grasses have specialized structures that aid their reproduction and dispersal. We’ll explore the basics of these two groups and their strategies, then be introduced to some of Iowa’s more commonly encountered ferns and grasses, along with maps of their occurrence in the state.

Deborah Lewis has been the curator of the Ada Hayden Herbarium in the ecology, evolution and organismal biology department at Iowa State since 1984. Lewis’ work includes collections care, and making the collections available for study, she also researches and collaborates the studies of Iowa’s plants.

Donald Farrar retired from Iowa State University after 36 years of teaching courses on woody plants, plant morphology, paleobotany, and ferns. In retirement, Farrar has coauthored books on Iowa’s trees and shrubs and has continued his research on ferns, especially the moonworts (genus Botrychium).

Phillip Klahs recently completed his Ph.D. at Iowa State University. Klahs studied the morphology and evolution of grass spikelets in the context of wind pollination. He is currently teaching plant science courses and investigating other aspects of grass biology, like root and leaf anatomy as a postdoc at Iowa State University.

True and Valiant: Perspectives from the Front Lines of COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has transformed life throughout the world. People everywhere have collectively responded in the face of great uncertainty. In this rapidly evolving information landscape, everyone from high level policy makers to everyday folks have had to make difficult, and sometimes impossible decisions, nowhere more than in the realm of healthcare. I hope to describe the arc of the broader COVID-19 pandemic effort through the lens of our local experience here in Ames, with a particular focus on the human experience of disease and the inspiring resilience of medical workers.

Dan Fulton, MD is an infectious disease physician at McFarland Clinic and Mary Greeley Medical Center. After growing up in northern Minnesota, Fulton attended Iowa State University, graduating in 2004 (biology) and then went on to University of Minnesota Medical School, graduating in 2008. After a year of volunteer medical work in rural Guatemala with the San Lucas Mission, he completed an internal medicine residency followed by a year as chief resident at Hennepin County Medical Center in downtown Minneapolis. He returned to Iowa, completing an infectious disease fellowship at the University of Iowa and a Quality Scholars fellowship with the VA. He and Lois and their five daughters returned to Ames in 2015.

Supply Chains: Returning to the Status Quo or Forever Changed?

Tuesday, Apr. 26, 2022, 3:00 - 4:30 PM CT

During the Covid-19 pandemic, supply chain management (SCM) went from being a business function to headline news and household conversations. This Osher Lecture will explore the discipline of SCM and its importance in today's world. Global supply chains, often designed to be efficient and low cost, are struggling with demand spikes, changing consumer preferences and supply uncertainty. Will these challenges be resolved for a return to the status quo, or will supply chain managers need to reimagine business integration to be resilient and agile while maintaining efficiency?

Bobby Martens is the Iowa Institute of Cooperatives Endowed Professor of Economics and associate professor of economics. Prior to joining the economics department, Martens spent 15 years as an associate professor of supply chain management in the Ivy College of Business, also at Iowa State University. He earned his Ph.D. from Purdue University and master's and bachelor's degrees in agricultural economics from North Dakota State University. His current position is 55 percent extension, focusing on cooperatives and the supply chain in which they operate (agriculture and food supply chains).

Perennial Groundcover Approaches to Pressing Conservation Challenges

Tuesday, May 3, 2022, 3:00 - 4:30 PM CT

Reducing the unintended consequences of agricultural production – particularly in relation to soil and water conservation – is a longstanding challenge. While solutions exist, their implementation has been slower than desired. In this talk, we'll discuss some of the barriers to implementing these solutions, and dive into one emerging approach to reducing soil loss and nutrient export from the predominant agricultural systems in the upper Midwest. We'll detail the promise of perennial groundcover systems, describe some specific challenges to realizing the vision, and the talk about the organization of a large, multi-disciplinary effort to address these challenges, led by faculty at Iowa State University.

D. Raj Raman is Morrill Professor of Agricultural and Biosystems Engineering at Iowa State University. Raman holds a bachelor's in Electrical Engineering (from RIT) and doctorate in agricultural and biological engineering (from Cornell). He has taught and administered educational programs for 28 years and been recognized with multiple university and national teaching awards. Since 2017, he has partnered with Ken Moore (Distinguished Professor of Agronomy) on the perennial groundcover initiative at Iowa State University, seeing it as a scalable approach to addressing longstanding challenges in soil conservation and water quality.

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Sustainable Pathways to Natural Chemicals

Tuesday, May 10, 2022, 3:00 - 4:30 PM CT

Identifying scalable, sustainable pathways to chemicals is a key goal. The Center for Biorenewable Chemicals is focused on the interplay between biocatalysis and chemical catalysis. One of the key research thrusts is the production of pyrones (oxygen containing six-membered rings) from glucose and the conversion of these pyrones into both existing chemicals (drop-in chemicals) and new chemicals with improved functionality. Two pyrones have been extensively studied in this center, both from their production from glucose and from their emergence as platform chemicals for the production of new compounds. One of the natural pyrones, pogostone, has antifungal and insecticidal activity. Significantly, certain analogs of pogostone have much better biological activity. Coumalic acid, a naturally occurring organic acid, has been converted into a variety of aromatic acids, some of which function as preservatives, plasticizers or antimicrobials.

George Kraus received a bachelor's degree in chemistry from the University of Rochester in 1972 and a Ph.D. in chemistry from Columbia University in 1976. Kraus went to Iowa State University where he is now a University Professor of Chemistry. He has authored over 350 publications. He became an American Association for the Advancement of Science fellow in 2009 and was elected as a fellow of the Royal Society of Chemistry in 2013. His research interests include the development of green chemistry methods and the chemistry of biobased products. He is active in the Center for Biorenewable Chemicals.

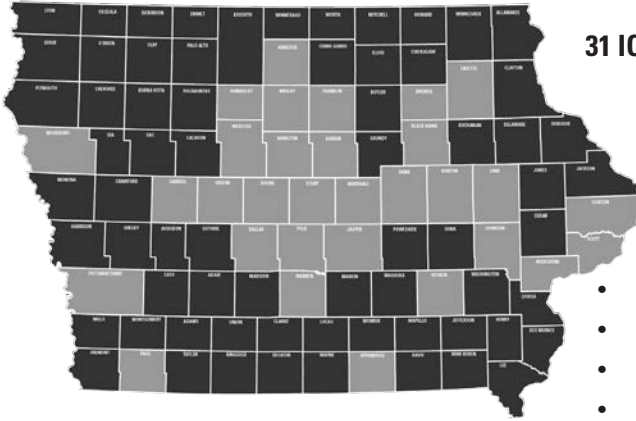

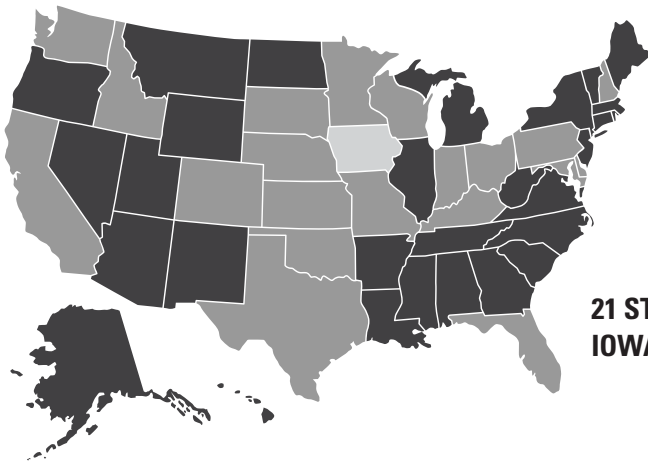
